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INTRODUCTION

For Forum and its members, the shock of COVID-19 in 2020 evolved into a new normal in 2021, with member organisations continuing their work within the constraints of the Pandemic. Forum members showed extraordinary resilience and ingenuity through this time, introducing online volunteering programmes and relying on national volunteers and in-country staff to maintain their support to communities around the world. Many of our members also developed new health projects in response to COVID, supporting public health campaigns and over-stretched health professionals.

Within Forum, we continued to support our member organisations to navigate these challenges. A new phase of the Pandemic also allowed us to consider questions beyond COVID, and we hosted online meetings on topics like public diplomacy and the social contract. Questions of diversity, inclusion, and decolonising our practice came to the fore. The new Community of Practice on Diversity and Inclusion developed into a thriving, passionate forum for our members to discuss these questions and the action we can take.

2021 was the first year of the <u>Forum Strategic Plan 2021-2025</u>, which includes a new vision for our network - a global movement of volunteers working effectively for a world where no one is left behind. The strategy reflects our broader focus on volunteering for development, while retaining international volunteering for development at its core. It sets out a path for Forum around four strategic directions –

- Enabling effective knowledge generation and sharing to promote good practice
- Improving measurement, visibility and recognition of the impact of volunteering for development
- Building a vibrant and inclusive constituency in support of volunteering for development
- Strengthening the relevance and capacity of Forum

IVCO 2021 was held online, on the theme Inclusive Volunteering for Global Equality. 72 speakers from 33 countries led conversations on how volunteering in development can embrace all forms of diversity, and how we ensure that no one is left behind.

These questions also informed conversations on the future of Forum. At Forum's Annual Meeting on the 14th of October 2021, Forum members voted unanimously to open membership to organisations in the Global South that achieve sustainable development by working with volunteers at the local and national levels. At this meeting, members also welcomed Mel Gow of AVI to the Forum Board and heard updates from the Board and working groups, where much of the work of our network happens. This report sets out details of this work, Forum's achievements in 2021 and our financial statements.

ENABLING EFFECTIVE KNOWLEDGE GENERATION AND SHARING TO PROMOTE GOOD PRACTICE.



IVCO 2021

ActionAid Hellas and Forum hosted IVCO 2021 on the theme Inclusive Volunteering for Global Equality. The conference had three sub-themes – decolonisation, directionality and digitalisation. IVCO is a unique event, bringing together heads of volunteer organisations and delegates from public, private, academic and non-profit organisations from around the world to network, discuss questions of impact and good practice, share innovative approaches, and strengthen collaboration between organisations.

IVCO 2021 was a virtual conference, bringing together 180 delegates and a further 340 visitors to a virtual fair. 72 speakers representing 43 organisations and 33 countries took part in 17 sessions, including panel discussions and pre-recorded 'Good Practice Pods'.

Forum would like to acknowledge ActionAid Hellas for their partnership in delivering IVCO 2021 and for their exceptional work as co-hosts.

The Global Volunteering Standard


The Global Volunteering Standard is the first globally-agreed standard for organisations that work with volunteers. It supports these organisations to become more impactful and more responsible in their practice.

The Standard was developed by Forum to help ensure that all development programmes are designed in partnership with local communities, that community members and volunteers are kept safe and free from harm, that the intended impact of programmes is identified before and tracked throughout, and that volunteers are fully prepared, trained and supported.

Following the launch of the Standard in 2019 and a pilot in 2020, it was reviewed, revised and re-launched in 2021. The review and revision was based on input from the pilot, as well as a particular focus on safeguarding, environmental protection, diversity and inclusion, online volunteering, and making the Standard more readable and accessible.

The Forum Standards Working Group also launched an online platform which houses the Standard, an interactive Self-Assessment Tool and a Resource Library of good practice documents.

The work of the Standards Working Group was led in 2021 by Co-Chairs Mark Cumming (Head, Comhlámh and Forum Board member) and Stephen Goodman (Chief Executive Officer, Volunteer Service Abroad (VSA) and Forum Board member), and coordinated by Rahim Hassanali of VSO.



Forum Research

Throughout 2021, the Forum Research, Practice, Policy and Learning (RPPL) Group hosted monthly meetings bringing together Forum members and researchers and academics who work in the field of volunteering research. These meetings featured discussions and presentations on topics including Forum's <u>COVID-19 and the Future of Volunteering for Development</u> research, preparations for UNV's <u>2022 State of the World's Volunteerism</u> Report, Restless Development's <u>Youth-Led Research</u>, and work on measuring volunteer impact from organisations including AVI, France Volontaires, and VSO.

As ever, the RPPL Group led the development of discussion papers to frame and inform our conversations at IVCO 2021. A new format was adopted – a framing paper, an introductory paper and a series of short think pieces. The framing paper was written by Benjamin Haas of the University of Cologne and Victor Moinina of the University of Sierra Leone entitled *Inclusive Volunteering for Global Equality – Linking Decolonisation & Diversity.* An introductory paper entitled <u>44 Questions about Inclusive Volunteering for Global Equality</u> by Gerasimos Kouvaras of ActionAid Hellas was accompanied by a series of eleven shorter think pieces on topics related to the conference theme and sub-themes.

The 'RPPL Day' was split into three online sessions around the IVCO conference, including retreat and planning elements. Over these three sessions, participants reflected on research practice and the assumptions underpinning it, especially in the context of engaging the perspectives of researchers in the Global South. They reviewed RPPL's work over the previous year and developed priorities which formed the basis for RPPL's 2022 plans.

The Forum RPPL Group was chaired in 2021 by Lucie Morillon (Director of Studies, Communication and Advocacy at France Volontaires and Forum Board Member) and Gerasimos Kouvaras (Country Director of ActionAid Hellas and Forum Board Member).



At the time of the writing of this Annual Report, the world is returning to a 'new normal' that means different things to different communities, organisations and individuals. Forum is proud to have continued to successfully adapt to an everchanging context and to member needs, while remaining true to our mission. We thank all members for walking the journey with us and for their ongoing demonstration of innovation and openness to strengthen capacity across the globe in volunteering for development.



Diversity and Inclusion

In 2020, Forum established a Community of Practice on Diversity and Inclusion. Over the course of 2021, this group explored issues of equality of access to volunteering opportunities, and delved deeper into the question of decolonising our practice. They held monthly meetings with guest speakers or set reading as the basis for group conversations. The Community of Practice also helped to shape the themes, programme and research for IVCO 2021.

The Community of Practice is led by Co-Chairs Erin Bateman (Director of Volunteer Cooperation at WUSC and Forum Board Member) and Ashraf Patel (Co-Founder of ComMutiny: The Youth Collective and Forum Board Member).

Security and Risk Management Working Group

The Security and Risk Management Working Group, which convened in response to the outbreak of COVID in early 2020, established itself this year as a permanent fixture with a broader remit to collectively address risk management, to share information and good practice, and to support our members' response to future crises. This group is led by Pierre Andipatin (Global Risk and Security Advisor at AVI).

IMPROVING MEASUREMENT, VISIBILITY AND RECOGNITION OF THE IMPACT OF VOLUNTEERING FOR DEVELOPMENT

Forum and its member organisations continued to play a leading role in the Volunteer Groups Alliance (VGA) in 2021. Forum members participated in the VGA's side event at the High Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development (HLPF). The theme of the side event was *Volunteers and COVID-19: How volunteers help build back better during the pandemic to achieve the 2030 Agenda.*

The Forum RPPL Group hosted three presentations from Forum members on approaches to measuring volunteer impact, a perennial topic of conversation for Forum members.

The RPPL Group has a renewed focus on ensuring that Forum research is practical and accessible, and rooted in the needs and interests of Forum members. They are also committed to sharing our research beyond Forum. The *COVID-19* and the *Future of Volunteering for Development* research was presented at the International Society for Third Sector Research (ISTR) Conference, at an International Academic Workshop on Volunteerism convened by the Turkish Red Cross and elsewhere.

The annual Forum Intergovernmental Meeting was held virtually as part of IVCO 2021, chaired by the Ambassador of Canada to Greece, H.E. Mark Allen. The meeting included discussions on the IVCO 2021 theme, *Inclusive Volunteering for Global Equality*, and an exchange of views and experiences about supporting volunteer-sending during the COVID-19 pandemic. The group will meet more frequently in future, with one in-person meeting at IVCO and periodic online meetings.

Forum is resourced by membership subscriptions, income generated by the IVCO conference, voluntary contributions of project-focused funds from members, as well as invaluable voluntary staff time. The work of Forum is led by the Forum Executive Director, with the support and guidance of the Forum Board.

Forum's Executive Director was kindly hosted by Comhlámh in Ireland. WUSC (World University Service of Canada) provided in-kind secretariat support to maintain governance requirements and banking in Canada.

The Forum Board offers its wholehearted thanks to the Forum members who provided both in-kind and direct financial resources to working groups and the Forum Research Fund.

FUTURE DIRECTIONS

2021 was the first year of the <u>Forum Strategic Plan 2021-2025</u>, which moves Forum beyond international volunteering to embrace the full breadth of volunteering in development. In its first year, this ambition was made real by changes to Forum's membership structure. Beginning in 2022, National Members will join Forum, and bring with them a focus on volunteering in development at the national and local levels.

Following the launch of the Global Volunteering Standard and Platform, Forum's Standards Working Group developed a two-year plan to guide its work on developing the Standard and the Platform, promoting it to volunteer-involving organisations, providing them with hands-on support where necessary, and advocating for the Standard. This last point is a new direction for Forum, and will see members engaging with governments to embed the Standard into laws, policies and standards at the national and regional levels.

We look forward to IVCO 2022, which we hope will be the first in-person IVCO since 2019. IVCO 2022 will be co-hosted by Crossroads International and the International Bureau for Children's Rights on the theme *A New Dawn for Volunteering in Development*.

In the months before IVCO 2022, Forum will lead a Collective Strategy Process with its members and the wider volunteering community. This process will explore the challenges and opportunities facing organisations that work with volunteers, and set out a strategy for the coming years, including possible pathways to help organisations prioritise and effectively navigate the post-COVID environment.

As ever, Forum will continue to support our members by creating spaces to share knowledge, innovation and good practice, by framing conversations and debates, and through leading research and advocacy. We look forward to continuing this work to achieve our shared vision of a global movement of volunteers working effectively for a world where no one is left behind.
