
From COVID-19 and the Future of Volunteering for Development. Part 1: Research Report. Findings from a study conducted for the International Forum for Volunteering in Development.

#### Introduction

2020 presented new and unique challenges for the Forum community, and we saw Forum members and their volunteers demonstrate their resilience and adaptive capabilities. As a community, Forum members know that volunteers make a unique contribution to development cooperation, and also that volunteers and the organisations that support them have a particular resilience and commitment to the people they serve. These qualities came to the fore in 2020 as Forum's member organisations worked tirelessly to ensure the safety of their volunteers and partners, to maintain support to communities, and to consider what the 'new normal' will be for volunteering for development.

Much of Forum's work in 2020 focused on supporting our member organisations to navigate the challenges posed by COVID-19. This included convening a Security Working Group to support members in their immediate response to the pandemic, organising a series of webinars on aspects of COVID response, and dedicating a day to COVID at IVCO 2020. In July, Forum commissioned the research project *COVID-19 and the Future of Volunteering for Development*. Initial findings from this research were presented at IVCO 2020. In October, Forum and AVI hosted the first virtual IVCO conference on the theme Volunteering for Climate Action.

At Forum's 2020 Annual General Meeting on the 27th of October 2020, Forum members endorsed the Forum Strategic Plan 2021–2025 and welcomed the new Chair of the Forum Board of Directors, Heather Shapter of Crossroads International. They also heard updates from the Forum Board and working groups, where much of the work of our network happens. This report sets out details of this work, Forum's achievements in 2020, as well as financial statements.



# Promoting Effective Knowledge Generation & Sharing Amongst Members

#### **IVCO 2020**

AVI and Forum jointly hosted the IVCO conference, on the theme Volunteering for Climate Action. The Annual IVCO Conference is a unique event, bringing together heads of volunteer organisations and delegates from public, private, academic and NGO organisations from around the world to network, discuss questions of impact and good practice, share innovative approaches, and strengthen collaboration between organisations.

IVCO 2020 was the first virtual IVCO conference, bringing together 260 delegates representing the breadth of volunteering for development organisations. 38 speakers from 17 countries were featured over 19 sessions, including panels and workshops. The event also hosted 17 exhibitor booths and virtual networking in the 'Bula Lounge'.

Forum would like to acknowledge AVI for their exceptional work in hosting IVCO 2020, which succeeded in bringing the operational and social aspects of IVCO into a virtual space.

#### The Global Standard

Following the successful launch of the <u>Global Standard for Volunteering for Development</u> at IVCO 2019, the Forum Standards Working Group piloted the Standard in 2020. The Standard was piloted by a group of 18 organisations from within and outside the Forum network, working with all types of volunteers in a variety of programme areas and contexts. We are grateful to these organisations for supporting the pilot and sharing their insights with the Working Group. A report of the pilot can be found <u>here</u>.

Based on this pilot, the Forum Standards Working Group will publish a revised Standard at IVCO 2021.

Forum's overarching aim in creating and managing the Standard is to promote more impactful and more responsible volunteering. The work of the Standards Working Group was led in 2020 by Co-Chairs Mark Cumming (Head, Comhlámh and Forum Board member) and Stephen Goodman (Chief Executive Officer, Volunteer Service Abroad (VSA) and Forum Board member), and coordinated by Rahim Hassanali of VSO.

#### **Forum Research**

The Forum Research, Practice, Policy and Learning (RPPL) Group led the development of three <u>IVCO 2020</u> Papers to frame and inform conversations at IVCO 2020.

<u>Volunteering for Climate Action</u> by Cliff Allum, Peter Devereux, Benjamin J. Lough, and Rebecca Tiessen explores the connection between volunteering and climate action. It includes an overview of the causes and urgency of climate change and how they connect to volunteering.

Volunteering for Climate Action in Pacific Island Countries by Bonnie Learmonth is a more focused exploration of the efforts of community, national, regional and international volunteers in Pacific Island Countries supporting climate action, as well as how Forum members operating in Pacific Island Countries are supporting climate action through their volunteer programmes and reflections on what the volunteering for development sector can strengthen these efforts.

<u>COVID-19 and Volunteering for Development: Impacts, Innovations and Implications</u> presented initial findings of a research project launched by Forum in July 2020 and carried out by Helene Perold, Jacob Mwathi Mati, Cliff Allum, and Benjamin J. Lough. This ambitious research project explores the volunteering sector's response to the pandemic, new and emerging volunteering modalities, and larger questions

of what COVID means for the future of volunteering in development. It resulted in a three-part research series to be published in 2021.

The Forum RPPL Group hosted a virtual 'RPPL Day' immediately following IVCO 2020, featuring a 'Talanoa' on volunteering research in the Pacific presented by Andreas Kopf and Dr. Litea Meo-Sewabu of The University of the South Pacific. The RPPL Group also reviewed their work in 2020 and identified priorities for 2021.

Throughout 2020, the RPPL Group hosted monthly meetings bringing together Forum members and researchers and academics who work in the field of volunteering research. These meetings featured discussions and presentations on topics including engaging returned international volunteers, research for the Global Technical Meeting on 'Reimagining Volunteering for the 2030 Agenda', and work by France Volontaires on the contribution of French international volunteers to the 2030 Agenda and by Norec on integrating temporary employees in workplaces.

The Forum RPPL Group was led for much of 2020 by Co-Chairs Paul Bird, Chief Executive Officer of AVI and Forum Board member, and Odette McCarthy, Uniterra Program Director – a World University Service of Canada-Centre for International Studies and Cooperation (WUSC-CECI) programme and Forum Board member. In October 2020, Lucie Morillon, Director of Studies, Communication and Advocacy at France Volontaires and a member of the Forum Board took over as Chair of the RPPL Group.

## **Diversity & Inclusion**

In 2020, Forum established a Community of Practice on Diversity and Inclusion. This community has hosted monthly meetings in which Forum members share and discuss good practice and innovative approaches. It also maintains a reading list on inclusion and diversity in volunteering, and it has helped to review the Global Standard for Volunteering for Development and to guide the development of the themes and programme for IVCO 2021. Issues of diversity and inclusion will take centre stage at IVCO 2021 on the theme Inclusive Volunteering for Global Equality. The Community of Practice is led by Co-Chairs Erin Bateman, Director of Volunteer Cooperation WUSC (World University Service of Canada) and member of the Forum Board and Ashraf Patel, Co-Founder of ComMutiny: The Youth Collective and member of the Forum Board.

# Increasing Visibility & Recognition of the Impact of Volunteerism in Development

Forum continued to play a leading role in the Volunteer Groups Alliance (VGA) in 2020. Ashraf Patel, Co-Founder of ComMutiny: The Youth Collective and Forum Board member, chaired the VGA's side event at the High Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development (HLPF). The theme of the side event was Volunteers as Essential Community Heroes: the Role of Volunteering in driving action on Covid-19 and the SDGs.

Throughout the year, the VGA leveraged its role as one of the 'Major Groups and Other Stakeholders' to lobby individual governments, and to position volunteering for development at the HLPF.

Forum supported the United Nations Volunteers programme (UNV), The International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) and civil society organisations in preparing for the Global Technical Meeting on 'Reimagining Volunteering for the 2030 Agenda', which took place at the United Nations in July 2020. Along with UNV, Forum co-led one of the meeting's four workstreams – 'Volunteering as an accelerator for the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)' – and the Forum RPPL Group was a member of the Task Force for the workstream on 'Measuring volunteering for the SDGs'. Forum's Executive Director, James O'Brien, spoke at the meeting as part of a presentation on volunteering for SDG acceleration.





# Building a Vibrant & Inclusive Constituency in Support of International Volunteering & Volunteering for Development

In 2020, Forum's membership was made up of 25 members and five associate members. A special and warm welcome is extended to our newest members: ActionAid Hellas, Fiji Volunteer Service, Volunteer Involving Organisations' Network Sierra Leone, Volunteer Involving Organizations Society, Kenya, and CNV Mozambique.

Combined, the Forum network now represents 141 organisations encompassing more than 10,000 skilled volunteers working across 124 countries.

Under the leadership of the Forum Board, Forum has four working groups and one community of practice:

- IVCO Working Group
- Research, Practice, Policy and Learning Working Group
- Standards Working Group
- Security and Risk Management Working Group
- Community of Practice on Diversity and Inclusion

Forum also supports the Volunteer Groups Alliance.

# Strengthening & Focusing the Capacity of Forum



In 2021 the Standards Working Group will review the Global Standard based on this year's pilot and will launch an updated version at IVCO 2021, along with a self-assessment tool and online resource library.

This is an opportunity for our community to explore questions of how volunteering contributes to systemic change towards a more inclusive and equal world, how volunteering itself can be more diverse and more inclusive, and the place of volunteering in discussions around the decolonisation of aid and development.


Forum will, of course, continue to support its members through the next phases of the COVID-19 pandemic and into the new realities of a post-COVID world.
